"EVERYTHING GOES ACCORDING TO THE BEGINNING."

These words, quoted from the teachings of Rabbi Nachman, indicate the importance of this season which offers each of us a fresh start. The Ten Days of Awe, known as the *Yamim Noraim*, offer a unique opportunity not only to reflect on the year we are concluding, but also to focus on our goals for the year ahead. Our actions during this auspicious time set the tone and the path for the upcoming year.

Indeed, this year especially offers us the chance to make a meaningful difference. As we end the Jewish year of 5771, we are witnessing historic changes in countries across the Middle East. The wave of revolutions that has come to be known collectively as the "Arab Spring" has not only resulted in

the fall of decades-old dictatorships, but also the opportunity for a fresh beginning for millions of people who have lived their entire lives knowing only tyranny and oppression.

While we hope the changes

sweeping the region lead to real and lasting freedom, history also shows that the path to a peaceful and secure future is fraught with danger.

In the scramble for power that has been created with the ouster of the despots, forces and factions that threaten both

the United States and Israel have been marshalling power with the hope that they will be able to fill the leadership vacuum.

Parts of Egyptian society are already calling to renounce the

peace treaty with Israel, and Iran continues its push to foment unrest in the surrounding states.

We as pro-Israel Americans have an essential role to play. As those who already enjoy the many blessings of living in a democracy, we have the right and the responsibility to continue to help our leaders understand the importance of a strong U.S.-Israel bond – especially during times of great uncertainty.

As we utter the *Amidah* prayer during the *Yamim*

Noraim, we ask for "blessings and peace." We ask to "be remembered and inscribed."

May we also use this season of renewal to act in ways that help bring the blessings of safety, strength and peace to America, to the people of Israel and to our world.

America & Israel: Working Together Toward a Safer Tomorrow

AT YIZKOR SERVICES THIS YEAR, Irit Sheetrit's children will once again utter the words of the *Kaddish* prayer for their mother who was killed by a Hamas rocket attack three years ago. Irit's family is only one of far too many whose loved ones have been killed in attacks from Hamas or Hizballah in the last six years.

Now, thanks to Israeli ingenuity and American support, a new rocket defense system has been deployed in Israel to help prevent more Israeli families from losing a loved one to future attacks.

The Iron Dome Rocket Defense System, produced by Israel's high-tech defense industry, destroys incoming rockets, missiles and mortar shells before they can hit their targets.

Israeli defense experts believe that Hizballah, with the help of their suppliers, Iran and Syria, now has up to 55,000 missiles and rockets which could reach

major Israeli population centers, including Tel Aviv. Hamas possesses an estimated 5,000 rockets.

The Iron Dome system not only helps protect Israeli civilians from indiscriminate attacks, but could also help keep American soldiers overseas safe from similar short-range rocket threats.

"The growing proliferation and increasing deadliness of missiles and rockets around the world.... pose a direct threat to U.S. national security," Rep. Steve Rothman (D-NJ), a key member of the House Appropriations Defense Subcommittee, stated. "Funding these new technologies serves our interests in the volatile Middle East, and wherever America's troops and citizens are stationed."

Recognizing the huge cost of funding such a program as well as the shared benefits to Israel and the United States, congressional leaders this year allocated


205 million dollars to help fund Israel's urgent procurement needs of Iron Dome batteries. Each battery costs approximately 80 million dollars. A battery consists of several launchers—each with 16 missiles, allowing the Iron Dome to intercept large numbers of rockets in a short time. Defense experts say Israel ultimately will need a dozen batteries, and point out that Iron Dome is not a 100 percent solution to the threat. Israel's defense forces also must purchase other systems with U.S. foreign aid to prevent the rockets from ever being launched.

Congressional funding was an important first step in addressing many joint missile defense needs, according to Senate Appropriations Committee member Sen. Mark Kirk (R-IL). "As Iran continues its pursuit of a nuclear weapons capability and works to expand its sphere of influence in the region," he stated, "we must find ways to expand Israel's military deterrence."

When Bad Things Happen To Good Countries

WHEN I WROTE MY FIRST BOOK some 30 years ago, I called it *When Bad Things Happen to Good People*, rather than “Why.” The title was guided by the wise insight of Viktor Frankl, that we cannot control what the world will do to us, but we can always control how we choose to respond to what the world does to us.

In 1981, when I wrote the book, Israel was just 33 years old, responding to international condemnation for its bombing of an Iraqi nuclear reactor and suffering from relentless terrorist attacks. It was no longer the media’s darling, as it had been after the Six-Day War in 1967. Subsequent decades would bring increased Arab violence, the threat of a nuclear Iran and a concerted international effort to undermine Israel’s very legitimacy as a nation. It saddened me deeply, as one who had picketed with associates of Martin Luther King and protested the war in Vietnam, to see former comrades in arms echoing anti-Israel rhetoric.

But, as in my book title, our concern should be not on why such things happen but on what we can do about them. The greatness of a democracy is that, as we have seen on so many issues, the collective voices of passionately committed individuals can make a difference. Votes count, and politicians count votes. We learned that the best way to make good things happen is not just to protest, but to make changes from within, to support, inform, build relationships with and help shape the views of those in public office.

For almost as long as Israel has existed, citizen activists, in the best American tradition, have worked to ensure that America’s leaders work to strengthen the bonds of friendship between these two model democracies. With the support of the vast majority of Americans, we have worked to ensure that America is prepared to help meet Israel’s economic, military and diplomatic needs.

As we prepare to greet the new year, we cannot know with certainty what the future holds for Israel—what challenges or new opportunities she may face. But in this season of renewal, we can recommit ourselves to working with our leaders to ensure that America always stands with Israel in good times and even when bad things happen.

Enhancing U.S.-Israel defense cooperation through securing hundreds of millions of dollars each year for key U.S.-Israel defense programs, including the Arrow missile defense system and Iron Dome rocket defense system.



Introducing multiple resolutions affirming congressional support for Israel’s right to self-defense in the face of terrorism by groups such as Hamas and Hizballah.



Strengthening U.S.-Israel energy cooperation by passing legislation that establishes a grant program, funding joint projects between U.S. and Israeli entities in the field of alternative energy.



Increasing U.S.-Israel homeland security cooperation by passing landmark legislation creating an office within the Department of Homeland Security to support joint research and development projects between the United States and key allies, such as Israel.
