32		MS. JOAN ALEXANDER: Good morning.
33		Our next speaker is a man with great
34		vision who understood early on in the
35		war on terrorism that America and
36		Israel were fighting the same battle.
37	0:21:27	[Applause]
38		SENATOR JOHN MCCAIN: Today in the
39		war against terror, we have no
40		stronger ally than Israel. We will
41		defeat terrorism against America and
42		we will stand with Israel as she
43		fight the same enemy.
44		MS. ALEXANDER: Four years after
45		Senator John McCain spoke those words
46		at an AIPAC Policy Conference, he is
47	0:21:49	still among the most vigorous
48		defenders of both America and
49		Israel's right to protect their
50		citizens against terrorism.

51		In the early days of the war with
52	0:22:00	Hezbollah this summer and in the 34
53		days that ensued we heard from
54		Senator McCain on a regular basis as
55		he highlighted and explained the
56		connection between Iran, Syria, and
57		Hezbollah. Last winter when Hamas
58		gained power in the Palestinian
59		elections, he was among the first to
60		state emphatically that Hamas would
61		not receive U.S. funding until it
62	0:22:25	recognized Israel and renounced all
63		terrorism. And Senator McCain was
64		again one of the first and has been
65		among the most consistent leaders in
66		advocating strong sanctions against
67		the greatest threat Israel faces
68		today - Iran and the pursuit of
69		nuclear arms. In fact, he was one of
70		the first authors of early
71		legislation to sanction companies and
72		countries that
73	0:22:54	were contributing to Iran's pursuit
74		of nuclear weapons. As Iran's
75		radical leaders have grown even more

76		abrasive with their vows to wipe
77		Israel off the map, Senator McCain
78	0:23:07	has stepped up his warnings that Iran
79		is not the kind of country we can
80		allow to develop the world's most
81		dangerous weapons. In the final
82		analysis, Senator McCain believes
83		that America and Israel face the same
84		enemies because they share the same
85		values. As he wrote three years ago,
86		in standing by Israel we are merely
87		being true to ourselves. If we ever
88	0:23:34	turned our backs on Israel we would
89		be abandoning the principles that
90		built our nation. In addition to
91		being a strong friend of the U.S.-
92		Israel relationship, Senator McCain
93		is a strong friend of AIPAC's and
94		mine. We are especially gratified
95		that he would be with us today just a
96		short time after the recent passing
97		of his mother-in-law. We offer our
98		deepest

177		Jewish State has experienced tough

179		perhaps been the norm rather than the

181		the conflicts 1948, the Six Day War,
182		Yom Kippur, Lebanon and the First
183		Gulf War, two Intifadas and Lebanon
184		again, it is clear that Israel has
185		been tested more in less time than
186		any nation on earth. Survival in the
187		face of such trials would be
188		impressive. Flourishing would seem
189		out of the question. Yet
190	0:28:12	Israel has thrived. There is no
191		doubt that due to its fierce fidelity
192		to its ideals that it has so
193		successfully defended its
194		achievements. I'd like to believe
195		that Israel's success has been aided
196		by America, another country born of
197		deals and Israel's natural partner
198		and ally. The tests continue today,
199		however, in the form of suicide
200	0:28:36	bombers and rocket fire in the anti-

201		Semitism is so pervasive in the Arab
202		press and in the existential threat
203		issued routinely by the Iranian
204		President. But Israel will survive
205	0:28:52	just as it has survived in the face
206		of armies and terrorists, just as it
207		has prospered in the most dangerous
208		neighborhood on earth so will it
209		succeed in the face of today's
210		threats. There will always, always
211		be an Israel. [Applause]. The path
212		of future success for Israel will not
213		be an easy one, and there will be a
214		number of difficult issues. Foremost
215	0:29:26	on many minds is, of course, Iran.
216		The world's chief state sponsor of
217		international terrorism, the Iranian
218		regime defines itself by hostility to
219		Israel and the United States. It is
220		simply tragic that Millennia proud
221		Persian history have culminated in a
222		government today that cannot be
223		counted among those of the world
224		civilized nations. When the
225	0:29:51	President of Iran calls for Israel to

226		be wiped off of the map or asked for
227		a world without Zionists or suggests
228		that Israel's Jewish population
229		return to Europe, or calls the
230		Holocaust a
231	0:30:04	myth, we are dealing with a possibly
232		deranged and surely dangerous regime.
233		The leadership in Tehran does more
234		than issue ugly pronouncement. It
235		acts in ways that directly affect the
236		security of Israel, the United States
237		and our friends. A sponsor of both
238		Hamas and Hezbollah, Iran has
239		repeatedly used violence to undermine
240		Israel in the Middle East peace
241	0:30:29	process. It supports militias that
242		have launched anti-coalition attacks
243		in Iraq and has sponsored at least
244		one direct attack against the United
245		States outside of Iraq. Tehran's
246		continued pursuit of nuclear weapons
247		clearly poses in an unacceptable
248		risk. Protected by a nuclear
249		deterrent, Iran would feel
250		unconstrained to sponsor terrorist

252		Its flouting of the Nuclear
253		Nonproliferation Treaty would render
254		that regime obsolete and would induce
255		Turkey, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and
256	0:31:05	others to reassess their defense
257		posture and arsenals. The world
258		would live indefinitely with the
259		possibility that Tehran might pass
260		nuclear materials or weapons to one
261		of its allied terrorists networks.
262		And coupled with its ballistic
263		missile arsenal, an Iranian nuclear
264		bomb would pose an existential threat
265		to the State of Israel. In facing
266	0:31:31	down this problem European
267		negotiators have outlined a positive
268		end game for Tehran should it abandon
269		its nuclear ambitions, far reaching
270		economic incentives, external support
271		for civilian nuclear energy program,
272		and integration into the
273		international community, but Terran
274		has said no. It insists on
275		maintaining and even accelerating its

277		choice is clear so must be ours.
278		[Applause]. Immediate UN Security
279		Council action is required to impose
280		multi-lateral political and economic
281	0:32:16	sanctions. The Congress needs to
282		pass before it adjourns this year the
283		Iran Freedom Support Act. And every
284		option must remain on the table. I
285		repeat every option must remain on
286		the table. [Applause]. Military
287		action isn't our preference. It
288		isn't our preference. It remains as
289		it always must the last option, the
290		last option. We have a long way to
291	0:32:45	go diplomatically before we need to
292		contemplate other measures. But it
293		is a simple observation of reality
294		that there is only one thing worse
295		than a military solution and that my
296		friends is a nuclear armed Iran.
297		[Applause]. The regime must
298		understand that it cannot win a
299		showdown with the world. It is in
300		the interest of Russia and China to

302		their business interests. Surely,
303		they do not wish to see a nuclear
304		arms race in the Middle East and into
305		the MPT in a more malicious Iranian
306	0:33:26	foreign policy in Iraq and elsewhere.
307		These two countries should know that
308		the United States will treat as a
309		defining issue in our bilateral
310		relations, but should Russia and
311		China decline to join our peaceful
312		efforts to resolve the nuclear issue,
313		we should seek willing partners to
314		impose multi-lateral sanctions
315		outside the UN framework. The
316	0:33:53	countries of Europe with their close
317		economic ties to Iran and diplomatic
318		leadership on the nuclear issue will
319		have a special responsibility in this
320		regard. We Americans also need to
321		reassure the reformers and the
322		millions of Iranians who aspire to
323		self-determination that we support
324		their longing for freedom and
325		democracy. The talented and educated

327		corrupt and repressive elite. Hungry
328		for reform and an end to their
329		countries international isolation,
330		they have voted for change time and
331	0:34:30	again only to discover that their
332		votes count for little with the

334		neither the jobs nor the freedom, nor
335		the basic human rights that their
336		people want so badly. The regime
337		cynically uses the nuclear issue to
338		rally its people hoping they will
339		forget the everyday difficulties
340		under clerical rule. After decades
341	0:34:54	of difficult relations with Iran, it
342		is important that we remain on the
343		right side of history supporting the
344		legitimate aspirations of the Iranian
345		people. The same holds true for the
346		Palestinian people. They are ill
347		served by a terrorist-led government
348		that refuses to recognize Israel's
349		right to exist, refuses to renounce
350		violence, and refuses to acknowledge

352		States cannot have normal relations
353		with such a government, one that
354		deliberately targets innocent Israeli
355		civilians in an attempt to terrorize
356	0:35:33	the Jewish population. In view of
357		Hamas' continued refusal to accept
358		basic standards of international
359		decency, the Congress should pass
360		before the end of this year the
361		Palestinian Anti-Terrorism Act.
362		[Applause]. This bill has passed
363		both houses in different forms. The
364		leaders of the House and Senate must
365		come together to resolve their
366	0:35:59	differences so that we can pass a
367		final version in November. It is
368		tragic that we have come so far since
369		1993, when Yasir Arafat and Yitzhak
370		Rabin shook hands on the White House
371		lawn, when it seemed that the
372		possibility of permanent peace
373		between Israel and the Palestinians
374		might be at hand. We also are far
375		from 2000 when Arafat rejected the

377		may ever see. Today, the dream of
378		peace has transformed into a
379		nightmare of terrorist attacks, the
380		radicalization of the Palestinian
381	0:36:39	population, and Gaza-based rocket

383		withdrawal from the strip. In view
384		of the increased threats to Israeli
385		security, American support for Israel
386		should intensify to include providing
387		needed military equipment and
388		technology. No American leader
389		[applause]. No American leader
390		should be expected to sell a false
391	0:37:09	peace to our democratic ally,
392		consider Israel's right to self
393		defense less legitimate than ours or
394		insist that Israel negotiate a
395		political settlement while terrorism
396		remains its adversaries favored
397		bargaining tool. [Applause]. This
398		is not to accept the eternal
399		hopelessness of a political solution
400		but to embrace the hope that Israel's

402	0:37:39	safety until a Palestinian leadership
403		truly committed to peace emerges from
404		the chaos and despair so evident
405		under the rule of Arafat and now
406		Hamas. No moral nation, neither
407	0:37:53	Israel nor America, can allow
408		terrorists to chart the political
409		course of its people. Nor would we
410		favor the Palestinian people if we
411		were to confer our acquiescence or
412		approval upon a terrorist syndicate
413		that has won elections among a
414		population desperate for change. We
415		will defeat terrorism against America
416		and we will stand with Israel as she
417	0:38:19	fights the same enemy. [Applause].
418		This enemy will not be limited to
419		Palestinian terrorism as the war in
420		Lebanon illustrated so graphically.
421		The cease fire, the UN Security
422		Council resolution, and the peace
423		keeping force are all welcomed
424		attempts to stop the fighting that
425		followed Hezbollah's unprovoked

426		attack. And yet I fear that we are
427	0:38:48	witnessing a mere pause in the
428		fighting rather than its end.
429		Israel's chance for peace with its
430		northern neighbor resides in a
431		Lebanon whose government has a
432	0:38:57	monopoly on authority within its
433		country. That means no independent
434		militias, no Hezbollah fighters, no
435		weapons and equipment flowing to
436		Hezbollah. It means bolstering the
437		security of Lebanon's borders and
438		ensuring that Hezbollah is not
439		deployed in the south. Yet, neither
440		the Lebanese Army nor the
441		International Force is prepared or
442	0:39:20	willing to take on Hezbollah.
443		So long as that is the case the
444		current pause is likely to enable
445		Hezbollah to regroup, reconstitute
446		and rearm. There is one bottom line
447		to achieve peace sooner or later
448		Hezbollah must be disarmed.
449		[Applause]. In the meantime, the
450		international community must make

452	0:39:54	not Hezbollah, is able to win hearts
453		and minds through social welfare
454		activity. Hezbollah started handing
455		out money in other forms of
456		reconstruction assistance within days
457	0:40:04	of the cease fire. Only by
458		empowering the Siniora government to
459		provide this aid can we help
460		marginalize Hezbollah and ensure that
461		it does not remain a belligerent
462		state within a state. But we have an
463		additional task. As Americans who
464		have suffered the pain of our own
465		countrymen held in Lebanon, we must
466		do everything we can to ensure that
467	0:40:28	the two kidnapped soldiers held by
468		Hezbollah and the third held by Hamas
469		return home safely. [Applause]. The
470		other area of critical importance to
471		the security of both Americans and
472		Israel is Iraq. Let me be clear.
473		Iraq is going through very difficult
474		times, and the next months are
475		critical to the future of that

476		country and the region. We cannot
477	0:41:01	wish away the many serious mistakes
478		we have made there or the violence
479		that plagues that society. With
480		civil war a real possibility the
481		temptation is to wash our hands of a
482	0:41:16	messy solution. To follow this
483		impulse, however, is a risk - is to
484		risk catastrophe. Most observers
485		inside Iraq agree that a precipitous
486		American troop withdrawal would make
487		the violence there much worse, not
488		better. The Iraqi security forces
489		are today plainly incapable of
490		handling operations on their own. If
491		U.S. forces begin a pullout, we risk
492	0:41:41	all-out civil war and the emergence
493		of a failed state in the heart of the
494		Middle East. Allowing such a haven
495		for terrorists to emerge would
496		profoundly threaten the security of
497		the United States, Israel, and our
498		other friends, would invite
499		intervention from Iraq's neighbors
500		including Iran, not to mention the

501		enormous bloodshed that would likely
502	0:42:04	be unleashed on the long suffering
503		Iraqi people. I believe that success
504		in Iraq defined as a stable state
505		with a flawed but functioning
506		government is difficult, but still
507	0:42:18	possible. We must do everything
508		possible to succeed there. And we
509		should not forget that the benefits
510		of success would be enormous for Iraq
511		and throughout the region, but the
512		road is going to be long and tough,
513		and it will be costly in dollars and
514		American lives. There are a number
515		of adjustments I believe we need to
516		make it is clear that the coalition
517	0:42:41	has never had troop levels adequate
518		to prevent looting, insurgency and
519		violence against civilians. The
520		Iraqi security forces will, I hope
521		one day, be able to handle these
522		tasks on their own, but today they
523		are not. As a glance at any
524		television screen shows so
525		graphically. And so while some

527		down of American
528	0:43:03	troops in Iraq, I believe we still
529		have too few troops there. Part of
530		the stabilization effort [applause]
531		part of the stabilization effort will
532		require dealing at long last with a

534		Just as in Lebanon the Iraqi
535		government will not succeed so long
536		as it lacks a monopoly on authority.
537		It is not easy to take on groups like
538		Muqtada al-Sadr Army, but is
539		essential for the future of Iraq. It
540		also involves reinvigorating the
541		reconstruction effort. In this year
542		of
543	0:43:42	unprecedented oil revenues, I would
544		like to see the Gulf countries
545		contribute to an Arab reconstruction
546		fund for Iraq. [Applause]. My
547		friends, the debate over the conduct
548		of our Iraq engagement has become an
549		element in a larger debate over the
550		roll of democracy and promotion in

551		the Middle East. Critics charge that
552		the emphasis America has placed on
553	0:44:09	democracy in recent years has only
554		led to results contrary to our
555		interests and site real and perceived
556		electoral setbacks in the Palestinian
557		authority, Egypt, Iran, and
558	0:44:20	elsewhere. These are real concerns
559		and we can't dismiss them. Yet at
560		the same time we cannot always expect
561		a linear, forward march to freedom in
562		countries that have never known it.
563		On the contrary, the road to
564		democracy is likely to be long and
565		winding and elections are but one
566		element of a larger democratic
567		phenomenon, an element that sometimes
568	0:44:45	cause - comes at the beginning of the
569		process, sometimes in the middle, and
570		sometimes only at the end after the
571		appropriate institutions have been
572		forged and values inculcated.
573		But if the alternative to our
574		democracy promotion effort is a
575		return to the days in which we simply

579		learned the dangers in such approach,
580		and the lessons have been painful.
581		If the despair, the alienation, and
582		the disenfranchisement brought in

584		the horrors of international
585		terrorism we owe it to ourselves, and
586		the world to promote change. Only
587		[applause] only this position is
588		consistent with the values on which
589		America and Israel are based. Our
590		two democracies are strong in arms to
591		be sure, but stronger still in ideas.
592		We fight this year - we fight this
593	0:45:52	year, and we will likely fight next
594		year and the year after that, and
595		though we fight to protect our land
596		and our people, we battle also for
597		the triumph of our values, including
598		that simple but profound truth that
599		all men and women are created equal
600		and endowed by God with certain

602		faith has forged a deep bond between
603	0:46:21	America and Israel. We are allies
604		and strategic partners, and that is
605		important. But we have a moral bond
606		too. As two democracies, fiercely

609		difference. There has been a deep
610		debate in recent months about the
611		wisdom of America's pro-Israel
612		orientation and even about the
613		loyalties of individuals and groups
614		like these. This debate, I submit,

617		to defend the principles that America
618	0:46:59	holds dear. I stand here today as I
619		believe all of you stand here as well
620		proudly pro American and proudly pro
